When we think of Jewish-Christian encounters in the High Middle Ages, disputation and polemic are often the first things that come to mind. However, the abbey of Saint Victor, in the mid-twelfth century, also witnessed a different kind of interaction between Christians and Jews: an encounter centered not on what divided but on what united them. The discovery of a shared scriptural heritage could lead to mutual learning, but it was not always without challenges.

His publications include *Life at Saint Victor* (2021), *An Introduction to the Medieval Bible* (2014), *Interpretation of Scripture: Practice* (2015), and *Interpretation of Scripture: Theory* (2012).
