A Springtime Voyage to Greece & the Greek Islands



Dear BC Alumni and Friends,

I am pleased to invite you on a journey that will explore the long legacy of Greece. Perhaps more than any other land, Greece has exerted a profound and lasting influence on the development of the Western world. Democracy, philosophy, historiography, scientific inquiry, and theater, among others, were born in Greece. And there is no more delightful time to visit this ancient land than in the spring when wildflowers carpet the countryside.

We are also delighted to have **Professor Gail Hoffman** leading this trip, whose expertise in various aspects of ancient Greek civilization will surely enrich your travellearning experience.

We will begin in Athens, the city where democracy and so many other ideas and concepts of the Western tradition had their origins, and where we will tour its celebrated monuments and witness its vibrant contemporary culture.

From Athens, we will continue to Naxos, the largest of the Cycladic islands, known for its impressive main town, ancient monuments that include early Byzantine churches with exquisite frescoes, varied landscapes, picturesque old villages, and sandy beaches. From Naxos we will travel by boat to uninhabited Delos, the sacred small island where the divine twins Apollo and Artemis (Diana) were born, now a UNESCO World Heritage Site, and to Paros, one of the prettiest Cycladic islands, known for its white-washed architecture and the magnificent church of Ekatontapyliani (Our Lady of One Hundred Doors), a center of Christian worship for 1,700 years.

From Naxos, we will sail across the blue Aegean Sea to crescent-shaped Santorini, perhaps the most spectacular island in the entire Mediterranean. Inhabited by a sophisticated society in deep antiquity, half of the island subsided after a cataclysmic volcanic eruption in the late 17th-century BC. Some archaeologists and others have seen this event as the origin of the legend of the lost continent of Atlantis.

We will then continue sailing in the Greek archipelago to Crete, home of the Minoans, who, during the Bronze Age, created the first civilization of Europe. Our three days will provide time to discover its famed Minoan palaces, see the treasures housed in museums, explore the magnificent countryside and taste the food considered to be the source of the widely celebrated Mediterranean diet.

To explore fabled Greece and its islands in spring is a rare and memorable travel experience. Please call today to join fellow Boston College travelers in discovering *Greece Through the Ages*.


FACULTY

Saturday, May 18 **DEPART THE USA**

Sunday, May 19

ATHENS, Greece

Arrive in Athens and transfer to the elegant *Hotel Athens Capital*, located on Syntagma (Constitution) Square, the heart of the city and within walking distance to many of Athens's attractions. In the evening, enjoy a welcome dinner. (D)

Monday, May 20

ATHENS

One of the most venerable cities, Athens is Europe's oldest city. Its ancient monuments are testimonials to its glorious past that gave birth to democracy and many other ideas and concepts that



form an integral part of the Western tradition. Tour in the morning the ancient Agora, the civic and commercial center of Athens and the living heart of its democracy. After lunch, visit the National Archaeological Museum, which houses treasures from Greece's ancient past. Spend the rest of the afternoon at leisure. (B, L)

Tuesday, May 21

ATHENS/MYCENAE/NAFPLION/EPIDAURUS/ATHENS

Leave Athens in the morning, drive over the steep banks of the Corinth Canal to reach Argolis, the northeast corner of the Peloponnese, one of the most significant historic and archaeological regions of Greece. Stop in Mycenae, the powerful center of the Mycenaean civilization, which flourished in the late second millennium BC, and the home of Agamemnon, who led the Greeks to Troy. After lunch in Nafplion, one of the country's most historic and prettiest towns, which is sited at the head of a spacious bay, explore Epidaurus, the sanctuary dedicated to Asclepius, the god of healing. A religious shrine and health center in antiquity, Epidaurus is famous for its incredible 4th-century BC theater, known for its perfect acoustics and harmonious proportions. (B, L)

Wednesday, May 22 ATHENS/NAXOS

Tour in the morning the Acropolis and its fabled monuments. Occupied since prehistoric times, the rocky plateau of the Acropolis rises dramatically out of the plain and dominates the modern city as it did in ancient times. The incomparable Parthenon and other structures built in the 5th-century BC, represent the highest achievement of architecture and art of the Classical period. Visit also the Acropolis Museum, which houses a remarkable collection of sculptures. Then drive along the Athenian Riviera for lunch at a restaurant by the lake of Vouliagmeni, and continue to the airport for the flight to Naxos, one of the most attractive of the islands known as the Cyclades. Upon arrival, transfer to the *Naxos Resort Beach Hotel*, our home for the next three nights. (B, L, D)

Thursday, May 23 NAXOS

Naxos is notable for its long history, varied landscape, old village, early Byzantine chapels decorated with frescoes, and vibrant contemporary culture. Spend the day exploring the island's interior, starting at the Temple of Demeter, which was constructed in 530 BC, and then travel to the village of Chalki, with its distinctive architecture and the church of Protothronos, dating to the 6th-century BC. Nearby are the villages of Moni, home to another early church of Panaghia Drosiani, containing frescoes. Visit also the village of Apeiranthos, perched on a high cliff; and Flerio, site of an ancient marble quarry, where we see two unfinished monumental statues from around 570 BC. Lunch will be served at a village taverna. (B, L)

Friday, May 24

NAXOS/DELOS/PAROS/NAXOS

Cruise by local boat to uninhabited Delos, the small island that was sacred to the ancient Greeks, as the birthplace of the divine




twins Apollo and Artemis. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, Delos is a vast archaeological site and a veritable open air museum. Walk the Sacred Way to see the remains of sanctuaries, temples, the celebrated Terrace of the Lions, and houses, some of which contain exquisite mosaics. After exploring Delos, sail to Paros, world-renowned for its fine marble and home to Archilochus, who was considered by the ancients to be as great as Homer. Visit Parikia, the island's beautiful main town, known for the typical Cycladic architecture of white-wash houses that line the narrow streets and alleyways. One of the most important Byzantine churches in Greece, Ekatontapyliani, is located here. Dating originally to the 4th-century, Ekatontapyliani has been a place of Christian worship for 1,700 years. Return to Naxos late in the afternoon. (B, L)

Saturday, May 25 NAXOS/SANTORINI

Tour in the morning Chora, Naxos's capital town, its narrow streets spread below a citadel built by the Venetians, who held Naxos from 1207 to 1537. Visit the archaeological area of Metropolis; the Roman Catholic Cathedral of the Presentation of the Virgin; and the Archaeological Museum. Facing the town is a small islet, connected to the town by a causeway, on which are the remains of a temple built in the 6th-century BC. Surviving is the monumental monolithic doorway. After lunch, sail to Santorini. As the boat





approaches the island, view the spectacle of the white-washed town perched on the 1,000-foot-high caldera. Accommodations for the next two nights at the *Hotel Volcano View*. (B, L, D)

Sunday, May 26 SANTORINI

Known in classical antiquity as Thera, Santorini was a flourishing trading center inhabited by a sophisticated society during the Bronze Age. In the late 17th-century BC, a massive volcanic eruption collapsed half of the island and buried its main town, now called Akrotiri, in a thick layer of ash and pumice, preserving its houses, streets and squares as they existed 3,700 years ago. Some have connected the disappearance of half of the island with the legend of Atlantis. Starting in the 1960s, excavations by Greek archaeologists revealed Akrotiri, the Bronze Age town that was buried by the eruption of the volcano. Visit Akrotiri in the morning, one of the world's most important archaeological sites. Only about one quarter of the extensive site has been excavated, but what has been unearthed conveys a powerful lifelike picture of a well organized and prosperous prehistoric city. Spend the afternoon at leisure to enjoy this iconic island. (B)

Monday, May 27 SANTORINI/HERAKLION, Crete

Visit in the morning the superb Museum of Prehistoric Thera, which





provides a fine introduction to Santorini's Bronze Age civilization, and whose exhibits include items found during the Akrotiri excavations, including murals that decorated houses. Then drive to picturesque and photogenic Oia, which commands the northern entry into the caldera. Nearby is the Domain Sigalas, where we will enjoy lunch, accompanied by the estate's excellent wines. In the afternoon, sail across the blue Aegean to Heraklion, the main city and commercial center in Crete. After dinner at a local restaurant, check in at the *Hotel Megaron*. (B, L, D)

Tuesday, May 28

CRETE

The largest of the Greek islands, Crete is home to Europe's first civilization, the Minoan, which dominated the Aegean world and parts of the Mediterranean, starting around 2000 BC. With an incredibly beautiful and varied landscape that harbors 2,200 plant species, outstanding archaeological sites and museums, a population that is renowned for its hospitality, and a cuisine that has been studied by medical doctors and nutritionists for its health benefits, Crete is a magnificent place to visit and explore. Leave the hotel in the morning for Gortyn, which rose to power in the 1st-century BC when it became the capital of the Roman province of Crete and Cyrenaica (North Africa). Nearby is the Minoan palace of Phaestos. Constructed in the second millennium BC, the site is beautifully located in a plain overlooking Mount Ida. Continue to

the village of Vori for lunch and a visit to the excellent Museum of Cretan Ethnology, and then drive through the scenic Amari Valley to Rethymno, one of the island's most attractive towns, known for its well-preserved architecture dating from the Venetian and Ottoman periods. Return to the hotel in the late afternoon. (B, L)

Wednesday, May 29

CRETE


Spend the morning at leisure. Crete has been known for its curative herbs since antiquity. You may wish to visit the herb market, where shops sell a wide variety of the island's herbs. In the afternoon, tour the palace of Knossos, the largest and most magnificent Minoan palace in Crete. Clustered around a spacious courtyard, the palace contains a maze of rooms, passages and stairways that probably generated the concept of the labyrinth. More than any other palace, Knossos reveals the brilliance and refinement of the Minoan civilization. Continue to the superlative Archaeological Museum, home to the world's finest artifacts. Farewell dinner will be served at a local restaurant that specializes in Cretan cuisine. (B. D)

Thursday, May 30

CRETE

Transfer to the airport for the return flight home. (B)
